# FOREST TREASURE HUNT

Zag will show you the treasures of the forest. It's up to you to find all these elements of nature. You can pick up any of them that have fallen on the ground, the rest are just for spotting. You can take photos of them to keep track. Some are easier to find than others. (1 leaf = easy, 2 leaves = hard, 3 leaves = very hard) At the end, count how many leaves you have collected to find out your score. In this treasure hunt, you're up against the clock... You've got 2 hours! Ready, set, go!



## IN THE FOREST... TICK IT WHEN YOU FIND IT



### TREE BARK

This is the tree's protective skin. Each tree has its own bark.



### A DEAD LEAF

In Autumn, leaves fall from deciduous trees. They enrich the soil when they decompose.



### A LICHEN

These grow on tree trunks, branches and stones. Lichens are a combination of algae and fungus.



### A FEATHER

The forest is a peaceful place where birds make their nests.



### AN EARTHWORM

Earthworms are very important for plants. They make fresh soil out of plants that have fallen to the ground. The many tunnels they make help to ventilate the soil and make it more fertile. You might have to scrape the soil a bit to find them...



### A FERN LEAF

These have a very recognisable shape, and they like the shade and moisture of the undergrowth. In some tropical regions they look like a tree.



### A PINE CONE OR SOME FRUIT

Depending on the place and season, you'll find chestnuts, acorns, pine cones, berries or other fruits...



### A FALLEN BRANCH

Deadwood provides shelter for insects and fungi that decompose it by eating it. It enriches the soil as it decomposes.



### A FUNGUS

Neither animal nor plant, fungi can be very nice to eat or highly poisonous. Be careful, don't pick it up!
